RASIGS RUGBY

Royal Signals Rugby Tour 2025

In honour of the 100th Anniversary of the Royal Australian Signals (RA Sigs), the Corps—through the RA Sigs Rugby Club—hosted a visit from the Royal Corps of Signals (R Sigs) Rugby Union Football Club from 30 June to 10 July 2025. The tour united serving members, veterans, families, and emergency services through a series of matches across South-East Queensland, New South Wales, and the Australian Capital Territory. Fixtures included both men's and women's teams, marking the first time women's matches have been played in Australia as part of this tour.

Women's Rugby: Coyle-Nesmith Trophy Retained

On Monday, 30 June, the R Signals Women's team faced the RA Sigs Women's team in a best-of-three series. The RA Sigs squad secured victory in the first two matches, claiming the inaugural Coyle-Nesmith Trophy. This was a proud moment for the Corps and a strong start to the competitive fixtures.

8 RA Sigs Centenary Rugby Match

Wednesday, 2 July saw the tour's marquee event at Norths Rugby Club. The day was well-attended, featuring Her Excellency, the Honourable Dr Jeanette Young, Governor of Queensland, the RA Sigs Head of Corps Brigadier Deane Limmer, alongside representatives from the Certa Cito Foundation and from one of our sponsors, GME. Also represented were representatives from the UK, LTCOL Ally Biggs DCOMD 7 Signal Group and LTCOL Ed Vickers, CO 1 Sig Regt (UK).

The two matches were played in a spirit of fair play and mutual respect, showcasing high-level competition and camaraderie. The first match was between a joint AUS/UK Signals Women's team and the Queensland Police Service (QPS) women's team. This hard-fought match was won by the QPS team 36-10.

The second match saw the RA Signals men's team square off against the team from R Signals for the Ramalli-Lawrence Trophy. The R Signals team claimed a confident win, 38- Nil, avenging their loss in 2018 and taking home the trophy.

Subsequent events

In a first for the tour, Rugby League was added to the schedule. On 5 July, the R Signals played against the Sigs Spartans (a veterans-inclusive team) at North Devils Rugby League Club. It was a close match, with R Signals narrowly edging out a win—marking the first real challenge of their tour.

The R Signal team then headed to Canberra to play in an Old Boys union match hosted by ACT Veterans, before returning to Sydney for a union clash at the Western Districts Rugby Carnival against NSW Police. The team returned to Brisbane, with a final match against the Brisbane Jackals at Aspley Rugby Club, before attending British Army vs ADF Barbarians match, followed by the Wallabies vs British Lions at Suncorp Stadium.

A Tour to Remember

The UK R Signals team departed Australia with high praise for RA SIGS and the broader Defence community. For RA Sigs, the tour offered a valuable opportunity to strengthen bonds with teammates and international colleagues, while proudly showcasing the **spirit**, **camaraderie**, **and capability** of the Corps in its centenary year.

HONOURING THE FALLEN SIGNALLERS OF SANDAKAN

On Anzac Day 2025, the CCF had the solemn honour of laying a wreath in remembrance of the Signallers who were interred and perished at Sandakan POW Camp. Their sacrifice stands as a deeply significant chapter in our military history.

Among those who endured the brutal conditions at Sandakan, Captain Lionel Matthews, GC, MC, remains an enduring symbol of courage. His unwavering leadership in Malaya, Sandakan, and his final days in Kuching Prison exemplifies heroism in the face of adversity. As part of the underground resistance, Matthews led a brave movement alongside Lieutenant Rod Wells, Lieutenant Russ Howlett, and Corporal Cyril Mills, whose ingenious efforts resulted in the construction of a secret radio receiver—a remarkable act of defiance that deserves recognition.

Equally important is the remembrance of the over 60 Signalmen of the 8th Division, dispatched from Singapore to Sandakan, British North Borneo. Initially assured humane treatment, they instead suffered forced labour, relentless brutality, and starvation. Tasked with constructing an airstrip to support the Japanese war effort, their suffering intensified following the arrest and removal of the underground leaders in mid-1943, leading to drastically worsening conditions.

By early 1944, rations were further reduced, and medical aid was withheld. In 1945, the notorious Death Marches began—260-kilometer treks through unforgiving jungle terrain, where malnourished and ill prisoners were forced to carry Japanese supplies. Many perished from exhaustion, execution, or disease, while others succumbed at the final camp in Ranau. By August 1945, as Japan surrendered, every remaining prisoner had either been executed or had died from starvation and disease. Of the 70 Signalmen sent to Sandakan, the only survivors were 14 of those who were transferred to other camps before the Death Marches commenced. The approximately 50 Signallers who remained at Sandakan or participated in the marches did not survive.

The tragic fate of the Sandakan prisoners, including the Signalmen of the 8th Division, continues to resonate today. We honoured their sacrifice as part of the RA Sigs Centenary, ensuring their legacy is never forgotten.
